### "From the Desk of the Director"

Dear Clergy, Religious & Lay Friends,

Enclosed please find a copy of the Graymoor "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity" Service of the Word. Though due to Covid19 we may not be able to gather with our ecumenical friends Jan. 18-25 this year (including our traditional Service at the Pastoral Center), the Service can be used anytime (E.g., 9 days between Ascension & Pentecost). The theme for this year is: "Abide in My Love... You Shall Bear Much Fruit." (John 15:1-17).

This "annual letter" provides me the opportunity to express gratitude to our Office Secretary, LISA PETROCELLI, who, like all of us, has had to work in unusual ways. Thanks also to the Commission for Ecumenical & Interreligious Affairs. Eternal peace grant unto past Commission Chairman: WILLIAM TOOMEY and past member, Fr. George St. John.

In the letterhead above I dated this Chanukah, Kwanza, Christmas. An ecumenical colleague noted that from November 1<sup>st</sup> thru January 15<sup>th</sup> there are c.19 holidays observed by 7 of the world's major religions!

The late Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks, international faith leader, as quoted in Bruderhof's "Plough Quarterly": "Today...dehumanization is happening to the Uighur population in China. It must be challenged by the global community in the strongest possible terms. Inspired by the courage and actions of men & women who spoke out in the past, we must reaffirm a fundamental truth: that our common humanity precedes our religious differences. Lose this and we lose ourselves and our humanity. We must not allow this to happen. We must not stand by."

Speaking of Bruderhof (3 of their communities are located within the Diocese of Albany), when a new Austrian Bruderhof opened this year Cardinal Archbishop of Vienna Christoph Schonborn (8<sup>th</sup> bishop & 3<sup>rd</sup> Cardinal in his family!) said: "It is a concrete example of the healing process, since of course the Anabaptist movement, to which the Bruderhof belongs, began here in Austria & neighboring countries 500 years ago. When Bruderhof members visit the sites of the original Anabaptist communities in Moravia, it inevitably reminds us of how the Anabaptists were driven from their homes under the Holy Roman Empress Maria Theresa."
