

Mental Health First Aid

For older adults and those dealing with later life issues

Mental Health First Aid is an education program that introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds an understanding of their impact and overviews appropriate supports. This 6 hour course (2 hour virtual self study, 4 hours virtual instructor led) uses role playing and simulations to demonstrate how to offer initial help in a mental health crisis and connect people to the appropriate professional, peer, social and self-help care. The program also teaches risk factors and warning signs of specific illnesses like anxiety, depression, substance misuse, bipolar disorder, eating disorders and schizophrenia. Includes training on Opioid overdose.

Like CPR, Mental Health First Aid prepares participants to interact with a person in crisis and connect the person with help. First Aiders do not diagnose or provide any counseling or therapy. Instead, the program offers concrete tools and answers to questions like, "What do I do? and, "Where can someone find help?" All trainees receive a participant manual at the completion of course work.
